142. To Receive Chairman's Remarks and Apologies for Absence  
Apologies for Absence were received from Cllr. M Milton.

143. Exclusion of the Press and Public  
There were no items for Exclusion of the Press and Public.

144. Declarations of Interest  
Cllr. AS Law declared an interest in agenda item 11 – Planning Applications and Decisions of the Sheffield Planning and Highways Committee.

145. Public Questions and Petitions  
The Chairman welcomed local residents from the Wood Royd area who had come to express their concerns at the proposed planning application 19/03890/OUT, 9-11 Wood Royd Road, Deepcar demolition of dwelling and outbuildings and erection of up to 42 dwellings.  
The Chairman noted that Cllr. RJC had put together draft objections from the Town Council and requested that these be read to those present, when any further information could be included if residents wished. These would then be passed under the Planning agenda item.  
Cllr. RJC noted that this item had been referred from the Committees to the Town Council in order to further consider concerns/objections in relation to this application. Cllr. RJC read out his draft objections covering Highways Access; Flooding; Ecological Issues; Traffic Flow and Local Infrastructure. The Chairman also noted the issue of former mine workings, the history of the old buildings and trees on the land with TPO's.  
The Chairman stated that the Town Council were taking the proposed application very seriously and offered the opportunity for residents to raise any further issues.  
A resident noted that he had been advised by a member of the Environment Agency that the local Council should be contacted regarding flood risk. It was explained that this was Sheffield City Council and not the Town Council.  
The resident noted a request to see the Bat Survey which had been undertaken as this was not on the Planning System but had received no response. Could the Council undertake a further traffic survey attending at peak times such as between 8-9am, 5-6pm weekdays or a Saturday morning to get a true reflection of the traffic situation? The buildings in question, in particular the farmhouse were over 200 years old, Cllr. JAG noted that they appeared on an OS 1851 map.

Residents of Wood Royd Road noted that they regularly had to park on Armitage Road as it was impossible to park in front of their own homes.

Residents raised their serious concerns with regard to further serious flooding issues if the land was built on as there would be even less drainage/run-off via the fields. There would be the issue of heavy traffic whilst any works were undertaken on what was already a hazardous road for school children to negotiate to nearby schools on Carr Road and St Margarets.

It was noted that these objections/concerns were the same as those for the Hollin Busk site, the flooding impact of housing further down the hill could only be exacerbated if building took place, it was common sense not to build.

A resident noted that the drawings were not to scale so did not reflect a true picture of the size of the roads in question and also noted that there was only one pavement on Wood Royd Road. Concerns were raised that it was mainly children going to and from local schools that used these roads, raising road safety issues due to sight lines with so many parked cars to negotiate, it being a bus route and on a hill where it was impossible to see all the way up the road due to obstructed view and curve of road.

A resident noted that the bungalows on Haywood Lane had narrowly missed being flooded this time but if rain water had nowhere to go in future there would be further flooding issues.

A lady noted the almost impossible task of exiting her drive due to parked vehicles and again raised safety issues for the children.

There were natural streams under the houses and open mines below.

Cllr. SA noted that the area was detrimental to disabled parking bays and asked if there had been any incidents of emergency vehicles not being able to access the area. It was noted that the road gets blocked if emergency services are called as there is nowhere to park.

Cllr. JAG noted that the Hollin Busk application had not yet been heard at SCC and requested any video footage/photographs from those present of the recent flooding to add to her compilation which would then be sent to Planning Department explaining the implications. Cllr. JAG also undertook to take up the issues regarding the Environment Agency and bat survey with SCC.

Cllr. MW noted that he had met the Environment Agency member in Fox Glen whilst investigating the flooding issues and he had assured him that something would be done as the event had been logged as serious.

A member of the public again raised concerns for the school children noting that the area should have a 20mph speed limit imposed.

It was noted that the road surfacing undertaken by Amey had made the flooding worse with the camber of the road level with the pavement in some areas resulting in water going straight into gardens. Cllr. JAG undertook to raise this matter with Amey.

The Chairman thanked everyone for attending the meeting and their input into discussions which would be added to the Town Councils objections and forwarded to Planning Department. The Chairman also urged all present to send their objections to Planning either via the website or in writing.

146. To Receive Remarks from the Minutes of the Town Council meeting held on 10<sup>th</sup> October 2019  
With reference to item 124 – Siting of Christmas Tree at Back Lane. The Clerk noted that she had contacted Valley In Bloom who had agreed to the removal of the bush in question, which was to be re-planted elsewhere and would hopefully be removed shortly, weather permitting.  
The Clerk noted that the Christmas Lights contractor had contacted the office to inform that the Christmas lights had been put on the precinct and were now lit following the Fox Valley switch

on. However, difficulties with a breakdown had meant that Bolsterstone and the tree at Back Lane had not been completed at the same time, however, these would be done hopefully by the weekend in time for the Bolsterstone Christmas Fayre.

152. South Yorkshire Police & Crime Commissioner The Clerk reported that she had received a media statement from the South Yorkshire Police and Crime Commissioner welcoming the announcement that South Yorkshire will be able to recruit 151 additional police officers. Copies of this correspondence had been previously circulated to members’.
153. Stocksbridge Community Care Group The Clerk reported that she had received a from Stocksbridge Community Care Group a copy of their November Newsletter informing of events taking place during the month.
154. Stocksbridge Library The Clerk reported that she had received correspondence from Stocksbridge Library informing of a public consultation/questionnaire regarding changing the Library opening times to when it is heavily used. This information had been put on the Town Council facebook page.
155. Stocksbridge Town Survey 2019 The Clerk reported that she had received correspondence from a local resident raising concerns with respect to the wording of the ‘Stocksbridge Town Survey 2019’ recently received by residents in the area requesting their input on funding it is claimed is to be allocated to the area. Copies of this correspondence had been previously circulated to members’.
156. Sheffield Lakes Landscape Partnership The Clerk reported that she had received correspondence from K Tomkins, Sheffield Lakes Landscape Manager enclosing a short report on the three woodlands events held during September including costs incurred and suggestions for any future events. Copies of this correspondence had been previously circulated to members’.
157. Bus Service Changes The Clerk reported that she had received correspondence from SYPTE informing of bus service changes effective from January 2020, also advising of consultations by First and Stagecoach requesting customer input. Copies of this correspondence had been previously circulated to members’.
158. Stocksbridge Community Leisure Centre The Clerk reported that she had received correspondence from Stocksbridge Community Leisure Centre in the form of a press release announcing £831,464 grant funding secured towards a major refurbishment project. Copies of this correspondence had been previously circulated to members’.
159. Steel Valley Project The Clerk reported that she had received an agenda and papers for the Steel Valley Project Steering Committee to be held on 11<sup>th</sup> November 2019.
160. Clerks & Councils Direct The Clerk reported that she had received a copy of Clerks & Councils Direct, Issue 126, November 2019.
161. Climate Action Fund The Clerk reported that she had received correspondence from Lee Thompson, Sustrans informing that the Climate Action Fund is now officially open for applications and Yorkshire based organisations are encouraged to apply.

162. Fire Alarm/CCTV The Clerk reported that the fire alarm had been triggered on Wednesday evening, resulting in the Fire Brigade attending site and the alarm company. This had been due to four youths accessing the small store room at the rear of the building. The newly installed CCTV cameras had picked them up running from the site. A new lock was to be fitted as soon as possible and CCTV signage installed.
163. To Receive Verbal Reports from Members?
- a) Cllr. JS reported that he had attended the Craft Club at the Inman Pavilion and Halloween road safety event at Stocksbridge Library both of which had been attended by over 40 children. Cllr. JS had also attended the Remembrance Day Service and Parade.
- b) Cllr. MW informed that he had attended the Archaeological Group AGM and the Steel Valley Project Steering Committee together with Cllr. ASL which he had found very informative as he was interested in the great outdoors. Cllr. MW had attended the Harvest Festival service at St John's Church which he noted had been strongly religious with a lack of diversity. Cllr. MW had also taken part in the Remembrance Day Service and Parade. Cllr. MW had spoken to some of the residents on Wood Royd Road who had recently been flooded and taken a walk into Fox Glen where he had met and spoken with a member of the Environment Agency surveying the flood damage and possible causes. The situation had been flagged as serious which he had been assured would trigger further investigations.
- c) Cllr. ASL reported that he had attended the Remembrance Day Service and Parade and the Steel Valley Project Steering Committee.
- d) Cllr. JAG reported on issues of anti-social behaviour at the Stubbin shops and roundabout informing that she had written to SCC to request that CCTV be installed again and that the bench be removed as a matter of urgency as youths were congregating there. Cllr. JAG had written to the local resident appraising her of what was being done and also suggested involving the local community in a litter pick of the area. The Clerk undertook to look into a suitable Saturday morning.
- Cllr. JAG noted that she had attended a Town Fund meeting, priorities for which had to be with the Government by December.
- There had been an issue with fireworks put on by the Bracken Moor Sports and Social Club which had resulted in animals being injured so a request was being made that they revert to the former site for fireworks.
- Cllr. JAG stated that she was in the process of collating all the flooding incidents which had occurred in the Town, including photographs, noting the work undertaken by Crown Cars Garage which had prevented many homes from being flooded.
- Cllr. JAG had made a noted of the abundance of leaves on Nanny Hill and the missing tarmac at the bottom of the hill.
- Cllr. JAG had attended briefly the Health Forum meeting and noted that she had asked the Community Forum to invite the Police to discuss the Gun shop on Manchester Road. Cllr. JAG requested that the Police and owner of the shop be invited to the December Town Council in order to raise the concerns of residents.
- Cllr. JAG had attended the People Keeping Well meeting; had done some filming of the Don Valley Trail in support of the Sustrans report; had met with the Cabinet Member for Transport which had been a really good meeting; noted the chaos and complaints caused by the road closures by the Sheffield Wednesday Football Ground on match days which were Police instigated.

Cllr. CW noted the chaos caused today in that area with a large crane being used to dredge the river causing tailbacks of traffic at rush hour.

Cllr. JAG noted that she had attended the Remembrance Day Service and Parade and also the Remembrance Service held at Bolsterstone Church on 11<sup>th</sup> November.

e) Cllr. SA reported that she had attended the Monday Drop-In three times where mental health issues were discussed and noted that the LGBT community are feeling isolated, suggesting this be looked into in the future.

Cllr. SA had attended the Craft Club and Halloween event at Stocksbridge Library; the Thursday Lunch Club; Community Health Forum, noting that students from Hallam University had dropped in which had not been appropriate; the Archaeology Heritage Day; Remembrance Day Service and Parade; as a STEP Board member she had been invited to meet Angela Rayner, Shadow Secretary of State for Education re SureStart; attended the STEP Board meeting and Over 50s meeting.

Cllr. SA noted the issues with respect to recent flooding, leaf clearing, concerns from residents regarding the gun shop and complaints that youths were hanging around the Youth Centre. There appeared to be pockets of youths causing anti-social behaviour around the area.

f) Cllr. RJC reported that he had attended a training session as part of being a School Governor; had attended the Science Club at the Inman Pavilion; met with a representative of the Friends of Hollin Busk group; attended the Remembrance Day Service and Parade; the Remembrance Service at Bolsterstone Church and today, together with the Mayor, met the young children from Early Steps Nursery in the Council Chamber which had been delightful. Cllr. RJC had also attended the switch on of the Fox Valley Christmas Illuminations.

164. To Receive a Verbal Report from the Mayor

The Mayor, Cllr. Catherine Ward reported that she had attended the following events since the last meeting:-

**RESOLVED:-** That the Town Council instruct the Clerk to write to Planning Department with respect to the above mentioned planning application expressing Councillors serious concerns with regard to this outline application for up to 42 dwellings on the area of land bordered by Wood Royd Road, Carr Road, Carr Grove, Frank Hillock Field and Haywood Lane.

Stocksbridge Town Council has serious concerns with regard to this application on an expanse of land which is hitherto largely undeveloped:-

#### Highways access

The proposed development site is very close to the junction of Armitage Road with Wood Royd Road. The centreline of the proposed access is around 20m from edge of Armitage Road, and the application justifies this close proximity by making reference to the junction spacing guidance in section B.3.1.2 of South Yorkshire Residential design guide. This guidance does not however stipulate that the distance should be measured from the centreline of the proposed and existing junctions; indeed, when measured from the edges of the existing and proposed junction the separation is actually around 9 metres.

Visibility at the access point to the proposed development is constrained due to the building lines of adjacent properties. Transport statement says that cars climbing Wood Royd Road would see slow-moving cars exiting the site and therefore be able to react in time. Stocksbridge Town Council would argue that road safety is the responsibility of everyone, and does not believe that the sole onus of road collision avoidance should be placed on road users who are already negotiating a steep incline on a road with two-way traffic, restricted width due to numerous parked vehicles, and already having to anticipate the busy Armitage Road junction which is also utilised by public transport.

#### Flooding

The application site is currently undeveloped except for grazing purposes, and as such allows a certain degree of natural surface water permeation at this critical location between Fox Glen, which is known to flood frequently and severely during bad weather events, and Clough Dyke, which also floods to a considerable degree during such events. The development of this site would inevitably lead to a reduction in the natural permeability of the ground, and indeed an acceleration

of the downhill flow of surface water toward Clough Dyke and, ultimately, the B6088 Manchester Road and the Little Don.

#### Ecological considerations

The site is currently home to a plethora of wildlife including birds and bats, which rightly enjoy protection under planning and environmental regulations. No assessment has yet been made of the precise species count at this site, however it is known locally to have a wide variety. This site is also close to the willow tit habitat which was recently restored in an effort to increase the South Yorkshire population of this threatened species. The site is currently divided up into fields by a number of dry-stone walls, which are known to provide a habitat for a variety of plant and animal species due to their ability to provide a range of temperatures, levels of light and degrees of water saturation in close proximity, as well as helping to provide a conduit along which wildlife can move from one area to another.

#### Traffic

Wood Royd Road is already a very busy road in comparison to its width, and feeds onto Carr Road, a major local road which is even busier, particularly at peak times. The applicant's own assessments concede that the development of this site would lead to a considerable increase in vehicle movements to and from the site. It is entirely likely that the majority of these vehicle movements would link to Carr Road in order to connect to the bypass and M1, as this connectivity is suggested as an argument to demonstrate the sustainability of the site by the applicant. This would however exacerbate the problems faced by local people at the congested junction of Carr Road and Manchester Road, near the Vaughton Hill traffic lights, which already cause significant tailbacks in all directions. Unfortunately, the applicant's traffic study was conducted at a time of the day when traffic was at or close to its minimum level.

#### Local infrastructure

Local services such as schools, medical and dental services are full and will struggle to cope with the additional housing which has been built or for which permission has already been granted. The provision of an additional 42 houses will cause further strain on services which are already stretched.

#### Built heritage and historical industry

The approval of this planning application would permit the demolition of a farmhouse which, although not listed by Historic England, predates an 1851 Ordnance Survey map of the local area, and has therefore been a fixed part of the local built heritage for at least 170 years. The official guidance for adding buildings to the List, from the Department of Culture, Media and Sport, states that most buildings from 1700-1850 which retain a significant proportion of their original fabric are likely to be considered to hold special interest, and therefore are worthy of consideration for inclusion on the List.

Very careful consideration must also be given to the stability of the application site, given the history of mine workings in this area. This not only potentially weakens the ability of the surface to bear weight, but also significantly complicates the consideration of issues such as underground drainage.

#### Conclusion

Stocksbridge Town Council would object strongly to this application the basis of traffic levels, highways hazards, built heritage, historical industry, biodiversity considerations, impact on local infrastructure and the increased likelihood and impact of pluvial flooding on-site and fluvial flooding off-site in the local area.
