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126. To Receive Chairman's Remarks and Apologies for Absence

Apologies for Absence were received from Cllrs. C Ward, A S Law and M Milton.

127. Participatory Budgeting

The Chairman welcomed winners of this year's Participatory Budgeting event held on 11<sup>th</sup> October and was pleased to present cheques to the following groups towards their projects:-

The remainder of the funding £2,083 is awarded to Christ Church but will be withheld until they have the balance of funds required for their project in place.

128. Exclusion of the Press and Public

Cllr. JAG noted that she wished to raise an item in Part 2 of the meeting.

129. Declarations of Interest

Cllr. J A Grocutt declared an interest in agenda item 13 – To Consider Planning Applications and receive the Decisions of the Sheffield Planning and Highways Committee

130. Public Questions and Petitions

A member of the public wished to know if there was still an active Young Farmers group in the area, noting the plaque at the bottom of Nanny Hill adjacent to the entrance to the Scout Group hut, stating the group had previously planted trees in that area. The Scout Group were wishing to adopt the area, make it tidy and commemorate the plaque and area to the late Queen Elizabeth II. The Clerk noted that she had made enquiries and there was a Young Farmers group in Penistone. Contact details had been obtained and were passed on.

131. Bus Services

The Chairman welcomed Mayor Oliver Coppard, SYMCA, John Young, Commercial Director, Stagecoach and Miriam Cates MP who had been invited in order to hear the complaints/concerns of local residents in respect of the effects of recent changes to bus services in the area.

The Chairman thanked members of the public for attending stating that at present the service was unreliable, with a doubling up of buses arriving and a lack of drivers.

Cllr. SA stated that members had been inundated with complaints, there were no other sources of transport in the area, medical appointments were being missed and post 16's could not get to further education venues. The area was totally cut-off.

A member of the public began by thanking Stagecoach for extending the 57 route to Moorfoot, she appreciated the changes although the service is still unreliable with drivers running out of time and putting everyone off the bus when this happened. The loop around Hillcrest Road/St Margaret's needed to be reinstated as this served a high number of elderly living in that area.

The current route re-visited Cedar Road four times, yet there was no provision at Deepcar and routing the bus down Victoria Road where there were no bus stops and cars had difficulty navigating the road was not appropriate. It was suggested that a boarding only system be put in place from Town as in the past with the reverse going back into Town. The lady thanked both Councillors J Grocutt and L Chinchon for responding to her calls and letters.

Cllr. RJC noted that broadly connectivity/frequency and reliability were the main concerns of the public.

A member of the public noted that frequently buses were 45 minutes late, she had recently had to get the 201 to Chapeltown to get a further bus into Town. People at Deepcar were isolated as there was no service to connect them to GP's and shopping facilities.

Cllr. SA reported that this area had the highest incidence of COPD.

A member of the public stated that it had just taken her an hour and a half to get to Stocksbridge from Sheffield train station, there appeared to be no thought to planning or the needs of people. The routes may not be viable but bus companies needed to take some responsibility for providing a public service. This was an ageing population and not everyone had a car or should need to have a car. The cost of a taxi to/from Sheffield was £25 each way, not many could afford this cost. There were no pavements as cars parked on them, there would be no service in the Winter due to the steep roads and no services to hospitals.

A member of the public queried why double decker buses were used, particularly on a Sunday when traffic was light, he was astounded at the route of the 57a within Stocksbridge. Stagecoach needed to take a detailed look at services and SCC take back control of the bus services.

Oliver Coppard, Mayor, SYMCA reported that he had been attending meetings in lots of areas/speaking on the radio etc., noting that people were having to make choices due to public transport, the service in South Yorkshire was not fit for purpose and has got worse, he grew up with a world class service.

OC explained that the SYMCA/SCC cannot control bus services, the companies run themselves, SYMCA pay for commercial services. Fewer people use the buses due to unreliability so routes get cancelled as they are not viable, it is a spiral of decline. In the cost of living and environmental crisis people should not have to use cars.

OC was trying to accelerate the franchising process and bring it back to public control but this would mean change to Government process. OC suggested a further meeting in 6 months time to look again at reliability as Stagecoach and First have stated 98/99% reliability in first year. Miriam Cates MP appreciated peoples comments but stated that there had been a considerable decline in bus usage since Covid. Funding was the main issue, over Covid the Government got involved to fund the transport services. MC was in Parliament lobbying Government and awaiting the outcome of the Towns Fund bid, part of which was to commission small buses

around the area to link to the Manchester Road service. The Bus Service Improvement Programme had not been successful for South Yorkshire with no funding being received. MC had met with the Bus Minister and asked what could be done to get South Yorkshire a slice of funding.

OC stated that it had been an ambitious bid and he did not know why the area had been unsuccessful. £80 million had been requested with a further £40 million annually. The Government could change the rules to allow Local Authorities to start a bus company following rural service models that work.

MC noted the recent success with the 26 bus service at Penistone.

A member of the public wished to raise her concerns with the bus route coming down Victoria Road, a lot of children play in this area and it was already hazardous with cars parking on pavements on both sides of the road. Double decker buses were mounting the pavement due to lack of space on the road, dangerous driving was an issue and beeping of horns as people were asked to move their cars so buses could pass.

A member of the public stated that levelling up should increase funding for the North and asked what was being done to increase funding.

MC stated that she was lobbying for more funding, there was a need to get the service to a reliable level to get the confidence and patronage up.

A member of the public proposed that smaller buses be utilised to bring people up/down the hills to connect with the route on Manchester Road into the City or to the tram. The train line into Town should be reinstated.

MC informed that they were in the process of a bid to restore the passenger line from Stocksbridge to Sheffield.

A member of the public queried why the £2 tickets were not transferrable.

OC stated that there was a need for a hopper system as in other areas. There was a huge disparity between here and London and funding required levelling. All bids were into the Government awaiting decisions. The Spending Review next week may provide some answers.

A member of the public noted that Manchester and West Yorkshire were forging ahead with great transport services.

OC stated that Andy Burnham had been through the process and they now have control of the services.

John Young, Stagecoach stated that there had been some good points made, informing that the main problem was a shortage of drivers. Stagecoach were looking at improving working conditions and were making progress but it was challenging. Drivers faced a lot of abuse and anti-social behaviour from customers.

JY informed that from 2014/15 to 2021/22 £1.855 million had been lost running services to Stocksbridge, the 201 tram link buses being the main issue.

JY stated that following the introduction of the new services in October it became apparent that there were serious problems. Stagecoach were trying to fix the problems but did not have sufficient data/research at this time. Some changes had been implemented but they were not there yet and a further timetable change would be made in January.

JY noted his concerns with drivers running out of time and will look into the matter, it should not be happening. JY noted that it was a challenge to increase patronage.

JY understood the issues at Deepcar and Victoria Road and accessing medical/educational facilities. JS will look into these issues and speak to the SYMCA regarding funding. The idea of the boarding only service to Middlewood was not commercially viable but he was very interested in the idea of smaller buses linking to the main route into Town and Stagecoach were committed to getting it right. 96% of the service was reliable the remaining 4% was due to driver shortages/repairs/break downs/illness.

Cllr. JAG stated that it would be helpful if Stagecoach could look at the route and cover the GP's/Victoria Road issues.

JY stated that he was committed to taking the issues away and exploring options.

Cllr. JAG felt it would be good to work in partnership once the Towns Funding was received and felt that a further meeting in 6 months time would be a good idea.

The Chairman thanked Oliver Coppard, John Young and Miriam Cates MP for attending the meeting and listening to the concerns/ideas of members of the public.

The Chairman also thanked members of the public for taking the time to come to the Town Council meeting to ask their questions.

136. Steel Valley Project

The Clerk reported that she had received minutes of the Steel Valley Project AGM and minutes of the SVP Steering Group meeting held on 10<sup>th</sup> October 2022.

137. Bus Service Changes

The Clerk reported that she had received correspondence from SYMCA informing of bus service changes during October, services 57 and 57a in this area having minor timetable changes effective from 30 October 2022. Copies of this correspondence had been previously circulated to members'.

The Clerk reported that she had received further correspondence from SYMCA informing that with effect from 2024 South Yorkshire will have a publicly owned tram network as regional leaders have approved plans for the system's future. Copies of this correspondence had been previously circulated to members'.

The Clerk reported that she had received correspondence from SYMCA advising that with effect from 1<sup>st</sup> November passengers would pay a maximum of £2 for a single adult fare on the bus or

tram on journeys starting and finishing in South Yorkshire. Copies of this correspondence had been previously circulated to members’.

138. Clerks and Councils Direct

The Clerk reported that she had received a copy of Clerks and Councils Direct, Issue 144, November 2022.

139. The Friendship Hotel

The Clerk reported that she had received correspondence from The Friendship Hotel - Stocksbridge announcing the opening of their newly refurbished rooms to accommodate overnight guests, bringing The Friendship Hotel back to its former glory, in time for its 120<sup>th</sup> year.

140. Buckingham Palace

The Clerk reported that she had received a thank you note from HRH King Charles III thanking the Town Council for their letter of condolence following the death of his beloved mother Queen Elizabeth II.

141. School Council

The Clerk reported that she had received a request from Deepcar St Johns/Royd NI school to hold their School Council meeting in the Council Chamber. This had been arranged for 7<sup>th</sup> February 2023 commencing at 1.30pm. The details would be passed to the Mayor and Deputy Mayor for their diaries.

142. Clerks Reports

Leaves on Bitholmes

The Clerk reported that she had recently seen leaves being swept from the pavement along a section of the Bitholmes by three teams of Amey workers. This section of pavement is rarely used by pedestrians and the Clerk noted more pressing sections of pavement in the Stocksbridge area, eg Alpine Road and Nanny Hill/Bocking Hill, a request for the latter to be swept in time for Remembrance Day having already been made.

Remembrance Day/Clock Tower/Flag

The Clerk noted that there would be a Remembrance service at St Mary’s Church, Bolsterstone at 10.30am on 11<sup>th</sup> November to be attended by the Mayor and Deputy Mayor.

The Clerk reported that information regarding the Remembrance Day Parade and Service on 13<sup>th</sup> November had been previously circulated to members.

The Clerk stated that she had reported that the chimes on the Clock Tower were not chiming the hour chimes to the PFM Contact Centre at SCC. Arrangements had been made for Smith of Derby to attend who have advised that the motors have failed for the chimes. They have managed to get them working for now but are not confident that they will continue to work and cannot guarantee that they will be chiming for the Remembrance Day Service. There is a 10 week lead time before any works can be undertaken once a quote has been approved.

The Clerk informed that she had requested the flag on the Clock Tower to be in situ for Remembrance Day tomorrow and that it be left in place until after the Remembrance Day event on 13<sup>th</sup> November, she had been notified that this would be undertaken by Heightwise.

Stocksbridge Food Bank

The Clerk reported that she had received a request from Cllr. JAG to arrange for Rene Meijer, The Food Works organisation to attend a future meeting to discuss options for assistance in this area. The Clerk had raised this at a LAC meeting and put the organisation in touch with

Reverend Ian Lucraft and they were now involved in the Food Works Project at the Stocksbridge Food Bank. Rene Meijer would also be attending the January Town Council meeting to provide an update.

#### Christmas Card Competition

The Clerk reported that the judging of the Christmas Card competition had taken place earlier in the day, with 3 schools taking part this year, the overall winner being Molly Barden from Royd NI School. The winning design would be taken to the printers tomorrow, to be back by 24<sup>th</sup> November, the Mayor and Deputy Mayor could then visit each school to hand out packs of cards to the winner and runners up week commencing 28<sup>th</sup> November.

#### 143. To Receive Verbal Reports from Members'

a) Cllr. MW reported that he had attended the Queen Elizabeth II memorial tree planting event at Stocksbridge High School on behalf of the Mayor. Meetings with the Friends of Fox Glen group were ongoing with a further £1000 being secured from the Ward Pot towards the project.

Cllr. MW had spoken at the SCC Planning Board meeting with respect to the proposed Wood Royd planning application; had attended the Archaeological society meeting and judged the entries for the Christmas Card competition.

b) Cllr. SA informed that she had also attended the Archaeological society meeting and judged the entries for the Christmas Card competition; been involved in UDAC meetings and attended the Friday Drop In.

Cllr. SA had been involved in issues regarding heath and transport thanked Cllr. JAG for her assistance with a particularly difficult situation.

Cllr. SA reported that a resident on Haywood Lane had their car damaged, whilst parked on their drive, due to a motorist mounting the pavement, going too fast whilst weaving in and out of parked cars on the highway.

Cllr. SA reported a case of outstanding treatment received by the Ambulance service and A & E.

Cllr. SA was still involved in the Warm Spaces meetings which required co-ordination and undertook to keep members informed.

Cllr. SA stated that STEP Nursery was doing very well and had no vacancies until September 2023 and there was 100% occupancy at the STEP Business Centre.

Cllr. SA reported on concerns raised by members of the Smithy Moor Community Association.

c) Cllr. JAG informed that she had attended the People Keeping Well meeting; been involved in issues regarding the bus services, noting that the Leisure Centre had reported a drop in attendance by the elderly since the timetable changes; had attended Friends of Fox Glen meetings; visited the Food Bank and Towns Fund Board office; attended the Monday Toddlers Group at Stocksbridge Library and the Royal British Legion meeting.

d) Cllr. RJC reported that he had attended the School Governors meeting at the High School and Garden Village Community Association meeting.
